Surveyed the Ninth day of May Anno Domini One thousand eight hundred and thirteen In pursuance of a Warrant granted to Simon Snyder, Jun^r. bearing date the Eleventh day of June Anno Domini One thousand seven hundred and ninety two —

NOTE: I have found nothing else in Frederick Evans field Book, other than the following Note — Peter Waggoner February the 6th 1796 Beg. at a Post Adam Reager thence N 34 W 116 post on the line of George Croghans, thence along his line 80 per^{cs} run 100 post — the course of Croghans line is S. 52 W. ----- & from thence so as to include his warrant full. — By these note it appears to me to have been intended for the above survey. I found no other line than the N 34 W 116 line which is N 30 W 110 which is the division line between Snyder & Waggoners drafts as above can be seen, but his notes are not satisfactory for he says Beg. at a post Adam Reagers thence N 34 W 116 which doth not begin at A. Reager's for it begins at or on Barnard Everhard line, and the Warrant is not descriptive of the Spot — where it is laid, it will apply better for Waggoners Survey — there is more vacant land along the S 54 W line which Mr. Jacob Zornes wanted me to take on the survey, — as I found nothing more than the above field notes which doth not shew how far to go I only filled the Warrant and the date of the notes are before the date of Waggoners Warrant } which is 15th day of February 1798.
