Surveyed the 15th day of October, 1766 for Samuel Pryor on order No. 480 dated the 1st day of August 1766 Daniel Africa D.S.

To Jacob Spangler Esqr. S.G. George Bratton No. 24, not Pat'd. Moses Starr, not found, Samuel Pryor, Pat'd.

No. 1 represented by dotted lines is part of a survey made for George Bratton on order\* dated the 1st day of August 1766. This tract interferes one Hundred and twelve and one half acres with the Samuel Pryor survey. George Bratton conveyed to John Baynton, Saml. Wharton & George Morgan from whom the title descended to Michael F. Simpson who conveyed to Mr. Sullivan who conveyed to Henry Werts who conveyed to Mr. Yerhey who conveyed Thomas Weaver the present owner of all of said tract that is clear of the Samuel Pryor survey. No. 2, represented by dotted lines is part of a survey made for Moses Starr on order one hundred and five. This survey interferes one hundred and fifty one acres with the Samuel Pryor survey. Moses Starr conveyed to John Baynton, Samuel Wharton & George Morgan from whom the title descended to Michael F. Simpson, who abandoned his claim to this tract. The black colored lines represent a survey made for Samuel Pryor on Warrant dated the 1st day of August 1766, this tract interferes three hundred and six and three fourth acres with the Samuel Pryor Survey. Samuel Pryor conveyed to Samuel Wallace who conveyed to Abel James and Henry Drinter. Abel James conveyed his moiety to Henry Drinter who conveyed to Patrick Cassidy, who devised the same to Francis and Peter Cassidy the present owners.
