



A Draft of A tract of land situate in Woodcock Valley on two Runs running into the North side of Yellow Creek in Hopewell Township Bedford County Containing Two hundred & twenty five acres & allowance of Six percent for Roads & so Surveyed for James Elliott on Order No. 611 dated the 1st day of August 1766.

No 1 represented by the broken lines is a draft of A tract of land surveyed for James Piper the 7th day of March 1793 on warrant dated the 5th day of June 1762. This tract interferes one hundred and thirteen acres and thirteen perches with the James Elliott Survey. This land was sold from James Piper by the Sheriff of Bedford County to Samuel Davidson who conveyed the same to Andrew Livingston who conveyed part thereof to Samuel Livingston the present owner, the residue he conveyed to John Newcomer who devised the same to John Newcomer the present owner. The green lines represent the draft of A survey Tract of Land surveyed for John Flute the 19th day of November 1805, on warrant dated the 14th day of November 1805. This tract interferes fifty three acres and one hundred & six perches with the James Elliott survey. Daniel Sleighter conveyed this tract to John Flute who obtained the aforesaid Warrant and is the present owner. N.B. The blue lines represent a draft of A tract of land surveyed for Thomas Buck the 21st day of October 1806 on Warrant obi 27th day of June 1806. This trobl obi one hundred and four acres abl obi perches with the James Elliott obi Thomas Buck devised the saobl obi Buck and Thomas Buck. Thob l obi conveyed his part to Dr Daobl obi who conveyed to Pintney Brobl obi owner. James obi to Gabriel Heister Esqr. S. G. James Piper Pat'd. John Flute not Pat'd. T. Buck Pat'd.
