



Richard Hill, Isaac Norris and James Logan Commissioners of Property by their warrant Dated the 23<sup>d</sup> of November 1715. Granted a survey of two hundred and fifty acres of ~~land~~ land for Mordecai Lester, Henry Seaman and Adam Mott all of Long Island in Right of John Beckley who Purchased the same of the Proprietary by Deeds of Lease & Release dated the 10<sup>th</sup> & 11<sup>th</sup> days of October 1681 and afterw<sup>d</sup> sold the same to Thomas Place of Edington in the County of Somerset by Deed Dated the 10<sup>th</sup> of September 1688. w<sup>t</sup>ho by Deed of Gift dated the 30<sup>th</sup> of August, 1701: Conveyd the same to his son Joseph Place of Long Island whose son and heir Thomas Place of Long Island aforesaid by Deed dated the 2<sup>d</sup> of November 1715 Granted the said Land to the said Mordecai Lester, Henry Seaman and Adam Mott. The said Adam Mott and Henry Seaman Relin- quished and conveyd the said land again<sup>t</sup> to the said Tho. Place the said Adam by Deed dated the 16<sup>th</sup> of April 1716 And ye<sup>r</sup> said Henry by deed dated the first of May <sup>1716</sup>. After the Decease of the said Thomas Place his brother John Place of Oyster Bay in the collony of New York sold and conveyd the said land to William Jolliffe of the same place by Deed Dated the 3<sup>d</sup> day of May 1729 who by Deed dated the 26<sup>th</sup> day of November 1729 sold the same to George Boorn & Nicholas Scull of the County of Philadelphia in the Province of Pensilvania. The said Mordecai Lester by his Deed dated the first day of April 1731 for a consideration therein mentioned conveyd and confirmed his Right and Part of the said land to the said Nicholas Scull.

Now this may Certifie that in Pursuance of the aforesaid warrant and recited conveyances there was surveyed and laid out to the said George Boorn and Nicholas Scull the 26<sup>th</sup> day of April 1731 a tract of land in Oley in the said County of Philad<sup>ia</sup> Beginning at a corner black oak in a line of Mordecai Lincolns land Thence by the same north 70 degrees west 240 perches to a corner Hickory Then <sup>N</sup> 20 degrees east 100 perches to a corner black oak Then south 70 degrees east 240 perches to a white oak. Thence south 20 degrees west 100 perches to the place of Beginning Containing one hundred and fifty acres in part of the aforesaid two hundred & fifty —
