To the Committee^s of Property sitting in Philadelphia the 17th day of ye 12 month 1693/4 the request of the Executors of Tho: Brassey on ye behalfe of his Children.

Sheweth yt ye sd Brassey was a 5000 Acre purchas^e & yt att ye motion of ye proprietary to accomodate other new commers to sitt down at Darby did at yt instant time to make yt a town deliver up to ye sd Proprietary a considerable quantity of land which was laid out & surveyed at ye sd Brasseys charge & further yt ye sd proprietary & ye sd Brassey did make an exchange for ye Lots & liberty lands in Philadelphia for a house & Lott^s in Chester which became ye proprietary for an Escheat, but ye sd Brassey was alwayes under disturbance by one & another till now you were pleased to (o b. Literated) sd. Lots & liberty lands in Philadelphia proportionable to ye sd orphans fathers purchase & to take ye sd house & lott at Chester againe which sd house & lott cost ye sd Brassey for survey three pounds as by his acc^t doth appear.

May it therefore please the Committee^s ye promises Considered to grant to ye sd Orphans, A bark Lott opposite their front lott as others like equall purchasers have beeⁿ granted; and ye rather for yt the proprietary in his (obl.) dated ye 15th of ye 7th M^o 1693 was pleased to say (that he earnestly desired yt ye poor orphans be considered to yt utmost) and for so doing they will forever be obliged to pray &c.
