

Pursuant to a warrant under the hand and seal of the Proprietary and Governor to me directed bearing date the 20<sup>th</sup> day of the 1<sup>st</sup> month 1701. I do hereby certify that for finally concluding the Controversy between James Atkinson on the one hand and Allen Foster and Benjamin Duffield on the other about the Line of Division between their Lands situate in Dublin Township in the County of Philadelphia. I have caused to be resurveyed the whole tract claimed by the said Allen Foster and Benjamin Duffield laid out on the 19<sup>th</sup> day of the 7<sup>th</sup> month 1682 for five hundred acres by virtue of a warrant from the Proprietary and Governor's first Commissioner's dated the 12<sup>th</sup> of October 1700 (o b l i t e r a t e d.) at a black oak dividing it from his land, and from thence runs by an old line of marked trees northwest two hundred and two perches to a corner dividing it from John Mason's land, from thence by a line of marked trees southwest four hundred and seventy perches to a marked black oak, from thence south east by an old line of marked trees two hundred and two perches to a stake sett in the ground being a corner James Atkinson ~~said~~ alledged to be the first bounded stake dividing it from his land, from thence north east by a line of marked trees four hundred and seventy perches to the first mentioned black oak, containing five hundred ninety three acres and sixty perches: But the said Allen Foster and Benjamin Duffield affirming that their first bounds run <sup>in</sup> forty perches in breadth within the bounds of the land claimed by James Atkinson, it will add to the said Tract one hundred seventeen acres and eighty ~~zero~~ perches, which will make it amount to seven hundred and ten acres (o b l i t e r a t e d.) perches: And further they alledging their settled survey by Patent extends twenty two perches <sup>in</sup> breadth within the bounds of the aforesaid tract claimed by James Atkinson, it will add to the tract claimed by the said Allen Foster and Benjamin Duffield sixty four acres and one hundred perches, which will make it amount to six hundred fifty seven acres and one hundred and forty perches. I do likewise hereby rectify a mistake committed in a former Return of a resurvey of James Atkinson's tract of land herein mentioned dated the 29<sup>th</sup> day of the 5<sup>th</sup> month 1700 partly occasioned by the neglect of the Chain Carriers and partly by reason of an obstruction my Deputy met with from Allen <sup>Foster</sup> in execution of my warrant of Resurvey thereon; for whereas according to my said return the length of the said Tract was but four hundred and sixty perches I now find it to be four hundred and seventy perches, which makes the whole quantity therein mentioned to contain but two hundred seventy and six acres to arable (to two hundred eighty and two acres). The said Resurvey was performed on the 26<sup>th</sup> day of the 1<sup>st</sup> month 1701, and is accordingly returned into the Proprietary and Governor's Secretary's Office the 10<sup>th</sup> day of the 2<sup>d</sup> month 1701.
