

At the request of Thomas ffairman. That I would grant him a resurvey on a certain tract of land situate on Pennapecka Creek in ye County of Philad<sup>ia</sup> laid out by<sup>a</sup> warrt from my self for five hundred acres to Mary Mason in right of her husband John Mason first purchaser, deceased ~~but~~ returned four hundred and eighty acres (the Liberty land deducted) and by Robt Mason ~~is~~ of ye Jno & Mary Mason sold to Tho: ffairman the present claimer: These are to require thee forthwith to resurvey or cause to be resurveyed the said tract according to its first bounds and lines of survey and make returns thereof into my Secretaries office. Given under my hand and seal at Philad<sup>ia</sup> the 8<sup>th</sup> of ye first mo<sup>th</sup> 1709.
