

Pursuant to a warrant under the hand and seal of the Proprietarie and Gov<sup>E</sup> bearing date the 28<sup>th</sup> of <sup>60</sup> 1700, Granting unto James Wallis of Bristol Mer<sup>t</sup> (at the request of his Agent Tho. Withers) to take up five hundred acres of land in right of an old purchase of one thousand acres made by the said James Wallis in England. There is survey'd to the said James Wallis a tract of land in the County of Chester Beginning at a white oak standing at the corner of George Pierce his land from thence extending by the said land south <sup>perches</sup> 264<sup>1</sup> to a post at the corner of Ezekiel Harlands land from thence east north east 260 perches to a second post from thence north east thirty perches to a third post at the corner of Tho. Robinsons land thence by the said land ~~264~~ ~~264~~ north west 116 perches to a corner Hickory tree from thence by the said Robinsons land north east by north 315 perches to a fourth post from thence west north west half a <sup>4</sup> poynt west 85 perches to a fifth post from thence south fifty degrees west three hundred and sixty perches to place of Beginning. Containing five hundred and fifteen acres Survey'd and lay'd out by Henry Hollingsworth the 27<sup>th</sup> of the first month 1701 Revised in the General Surveyor's office of Jacob Taylor.
