


Pursuant to a warrant under the hand and seal of the Proprietary
and Governor to me directed bearing date the 8th day of the 1st month 1709

I do hereby certify that I have caused to be resurveyed unto Thomas Fairman a certain tract of land situate in the County of Philadelphia sold unto him by Robert Mason Heir of John and Mary Mason, and formerly returned unto the said Mary Mason in right of her said Husband John Mason for four hundred and eighty acres by virtue of a warrant under the hand and seal of the Proprietary and Governor for ~~one~~ ~~one~~ five hundred acres (the Liberty Land deducted) but upon this resurvey is found to contain four hundred eighty three acres and one hundred fifty three perches, beginning at a stake sett in the ground standing in a line dividing Joseph Fisher's land from a certain tract formerly called Robert Turner's land, but now called Gwynedd, from thence by the said line of marked trees southeast one hundred fifty and nine perches to an other stake sett in the ground ~~one~~ dividing this tract from the said Joseph Fisher's land, from thence by a line of marked trees and the said Fisher's land north east four hundred eighty and seven perches to a third stake sett in the ground hard by a marked white oak, from thence by an old line of marked trees north west one hundred fifty and nine perches to a fourth stake sett in the ground in the line of Delwir's land, from thence by a former line of marked trees southwest four hundred eighty and seven perches to the first mentioned stake, containing as above expressed.
Resurveyed the 13th day of the 3^d month 1701 and is accordingly returned into the Proprietary and Governor's Secretary's office the 7th day of the 4th month 1701. Edw: Perrington Survey Genl
