By the Commissioners of Property.

Whereas George Harland seated on Brandy wine Creek hath requested us to grant him two hundred acres of land lying within a Bend of the 5^d creek ~~on~~ on ye north side thereof, over against his plantation on w^{ch} the Indians were formerly seated but have since deserted it, in regard of the great trouble & charge he has bore in fencing and maintaining the same for the said Indians while living thereon for w^{ch} he hath agreed to pay fifty pounds to the Proprietaries use, one moiety thereof at or before the first day of the third month next ensuing and the other moiety at or before the 29th of the 7th month next following. These therefore are to require thee forthwith to survey and lay out to the said George Harland the said number of two hundred acres of land in the place aforesaid and make returns thereof into the Gen^l Surveyor's office at Philadelphia where this warrant is to remain & a copy thereof to be deliv^d thee by the Secretary who is also to take a duplicate of thy return into his office. Which s^d survey to be by thee made as afores^d shall in case the s^d George fulfill the afore recited agreem^t. be valid otherwise shall be void & of no other effect than as if the same had never been made nor this warrant ever granted.
