By the Commissioners of Property.

At the Request of John Grafton of Notingham that we would grant him to take up two hundred fifty acres of land in the County of Chester for which he agrees to pay to the Proprietor's use five and twenty pounds for the whole and the usual yearly quitrent of one shilling Sterling for each hundred acres and ~~see~~ proportionable for the fifty acres. These are to authorize and require y<sup>e</sup> to survey or cause to be survey'd unto the said John Grafton <sup>County</sup> in ~~one~~ the ~~place~~ aforesaid according to the Method of townships appointed the said quantity of two hundred and fifty acres of land that has not been already survey'd nor appropriated nor is seated by the Indians and make a return thereof into the Secretary's Office which survey in case the said John Grafton fulfill the above agreement within three months after Location shall be valid otherwise the same is to be void as if it had never been made nor this warrant ever granted given under our hands and seale of the Province at Philadelphia the 5<sup>th</sup> day of the ninth month Anno Domini 1714.
