

At the request of William Vestal that I would grant him to take up one hundred & twenty five acres of land bought by him of Benja. Mendenhal being the remainder of five hundred acres purchased of me by Roger Ewen, the rest laid out to Jno Mendenhal, Thomas Martin and Nataniel Newlin. These are to require the forthwth to survey or cause to be survey'd according to the method of townships by me appointed to the sd W^m Vestal, the said number of one hundred and twenty five acres of land in this Province that has not been already survey'd nor taken up nor is concealed nor seated by the Indians, he seating the same within six months after the date of survey and make returns thereof into my Secretaries office. Given under my hand and seal at Philad^{ia} the 19th day of the third month 1701.
