of Pennsylvania & ye Territories thereunto belonging.

At ye request of William White yt I would grant him to take up  
one hundred acres of land vacant about ye township call'd Concord.  
These are to will and require thee forthw<sup>th</sup> to survey or cause to be sur-  
vey'd unto him ye said number of acres in a place not already taken  
up (wh<sup>ch</sup> ye survey<sup>r</sup> of yt part & Jno<sup>o</sup> Beizer may know best) to whom  
I desire it may be left to judge) according to ye method of townships  
appointed by me and make returns thereof into my Secretary's  
office. Given at Philadelphia ye 3<sup>d</sup> of ye 2<sup>d</sup> mo. 1683.
