



Pursuant unto 2 warrs from Edward Pennington the then Surveyor Generall directed unto me bearing date the 9th of ye 10th mo. 1701. I hearby certifie that I have surveyd the 23^d of ye same unto John Morris a certaine tract of land in ye County of Philadelphia begining at a post set in the ground being a corner deviding it from other land of ye said John Morris from thence by a line of marked trees north west 333 perches & $\frac{1}{3}$ part to a whit oak marked deviding it from vacant land from thence by a line of marked trees and same land north east 480 perches to a stak set in the ground in the line deviding the County of Philadelphia & the County of Bucks from thence by the said line of marked trees south east 333 perches & $\frac{1}{3}$ to a stak set in the ground being a corner deviding it from the aforesd other lands of ye said John Morris from thence by a line of marked trees and ye same land south west 480 perches to ye first place of begining containing one thousand acres of land and is according to ye bounds above described returnd into ye Generall Surveyors office at Philadelphia the 7th day of ye 7th mo. 1702.
