William Penn Absolute Proprietary and Govern : in Chief of the Province of Pensilvania and Counties Annexed.

At the Request of John Mendenhal, Thomas Martin and Nathaniel New-In ,That I would grant them to take up Three Hundred Seventy and five Acres of Land in Right of a Purchase of five Hundred Acres made of the Propres yezoth of June 1682 by Roger Ewen of ye County of Wilts who was Inherited by his brother Jnº Ewen, who by deeds of Lease and Release bearing date the 4th and 5th of 1 br. 1685 Convey'd the Same to Moses Mendenhal, who by Deed of Gift con vey'd it to his two Brothers John and Benjamin Mendenhal and to his two sisters Margery, wife of John Martin, and Mary Wife of Nath. Newlin, of which Benj: Mendenhal his Right being 125 Acres, to William Vestal of Westown in this Province: These are to require thee forth with to Survey or cause to be Survey'd to the Sa Jno. Mendenhal, Thomas Martinand Nathaniel Newlin the said Number of three hundred and Seventy five Acres of Land on the South Side of Brandywine Creek, near Michael Harlyn's lands upposed to be in the County of Chester, where it has

not been already Survey'd, taken up, nor concealed to be laid out according to the Method of Townships by me appointed, they taking out a Patent for the same within three months after thou shalt make Returns thereof into my Decretaries Office, win thou art hereby required to doe with all convenient speed Given undermy hand and seal at Philad is the 17th of the 10th Moth A.D. 1700
