At the request of James Thomas That I would grant him to take up three hundred acres of land in right of William Jenkins old purchaser of a thousand acres, These are to require thee forthwith to survey or cause to be survey'd unto him the said number of acres of land not yet taken up survey'd, nor concealed to be laid out according to the method of townships by me appointed, He taking out a patent for ye same within three months after thou shalt make returns thereof into my Secretaries office, which thou art hereby required to doe with all convenient speed. Given under my hand and seal at Pensbury the 2<sup>d</sup> day of the 7<sup>th</sup> mo<sup>th</sup> 1700.
