William Penn Absolute Proprietary and Govern^c in Chief of
the Province of Pensilvania and Counties annexed.

At the request of Robert Vernon That I would grant him to take up two hundred and eighty five acres of land the remainder of his original Purchase of six hundred and twenty five acres together with ten acres ~~of~~ his proportion of Liberty land unto him These are to require thee forthwith to survey or cause to be surveyed according to the method of townships by me appointed the sd number of two hundred eighty and five acres of land in this Province not already surveyed, nor taken up, nor concealed, nor seated by the Indians ~~not~~ survey being duly made and returned shall if seated within twelve months after ye date thereof, be confirmed to him his Heirs and assigns forever Also to survey to the said Robt Vernon the sd number of ten acres within the Liberties of the City of Philadelphia and make returns hereof into my Secretaries office Given under my hand and seal at Philadelphia the 21st of ye first month 1700/
