By virtue of a warrant from Edward Pennington Surveyor General bearing date the 21th of the 1st month 1709, I certify into his office that I have resurvey'd unto Allen Foster, a certain tract of land in Dublin township in Philadelphia County, beginning at a black oak alleged by James Atkinson to be the first bounded tree divideing it from the said Atkinsons land, from thence by an old line of marked trees N. W. 202 per[±] to a corner divideing it from John Masons land, from thence by a line of marked trees S. W. 470 perches to a black oak marked, from thence S. E. by an old line of marked trees 202 per[±] to a stake set in the ground, being a corner James Atkinson alleges to be the first bounded stake divideing it from the said Atkinsons land and by a line from thence nor: east extended to the first place of beginning 470 per[±] containing 593 acres and 60 perches, but the said Allen and Benjamin Duffield allegeding their first bounds to be 40 perches within the bounds of the said Atkinson claimies, and their settler survey by pattern to be only 22 perches within the said Atkinson bounds as he claimies, both answering the ^{dotted} lines in the figure annexed, the first line alleged by Allen to be his first survey gives him 117 acres & 80 p[±] more ^{return'd} than above said, the second line gives him but 64 acres & 100 perches more than is now returned. Resurvey'd and duly examined according to the lines and figure annexed the 26th of the same month by me.

IN TESTIMONY that the above is a copy of the original remaining on file in the Department of Internal Affairs of Pennsylvania, made conformably to an Act of Assembly approved the 16th day of February, 1833, I have hereunto set my Hand and caused the Seal of said Department to be affixed at Harrisburg, this twenty-fourth day of September 1909.
