



Whereas severall persons have requested part of the Bank of Philadelphia lying on Delaware River to build thereon Wee having taken into Consideration the Lamentable ruin which the said Bank hath suffered and daly doth, and that the Publick hath not taken care to prevent the same though often urged there- too, wee have therefore thought fitt whereby to putt a stop or as much as possible to preserve the said Bank to encourage those who are willing and able forthwith to perform the Proprietarys Regulation in Building against the said Bank wharfing out to low Water mark and leaving a Street between the bank and the Wharf according to the Proprietors grant to Robert Turner & Samuell Carpenter and Regulation.

These are therefore in the Proprietarys name to will and require thee forth- with to survey or cause to be surveyed unto John ap John thirty feet to the northward of but contiguous to Alex. Guests bank Lott, to Charles ~~Pickering~~ ^{Pickering} Twenty feet to the northward but contiguous to John ap John To William Lee Twenty seven feet, to the northward with but contiguous to Charles ~~Pickering~~ ^{Pickering} To Daniel Smith thirty feet to the northward but contiguous to W^m Lee To John Farmer Twenty Five feet to the northward but contiguous to Daniel Smith Philip Howell Twenty Five feet to the northward but contiguous to John Farmer, To William Bradford and Thomas Tress Fifty Feet to the northward but contiguous to Philip Howell, and make returne to the Secretarys office of each of the a- foregoing surveys Dated at Philadelphia the 29th of the first month 1689.
