

Philad<sup>a</sup> July 11<sup>th</sup> 1761.

M<sup>r</sup> Armstrong.

Sir: The Indians at Easton, having recommended it to the Proprietaries to let their good Friend Henry Montour have some commodious and good place to contain not less than fifteen hundred acres within the Lands purchased from them over Sasquahannati. When he was last here he applied for the same intending to go and locate it. And I consented to give him an order to you to survey so much for him upon the common Terms after he should return from Sir William Johnsons to whom he was obliged to go. But it seems by what M<sup>r</sup> Croghan says that he is detained by Sir William and is now attending him to Fort Detroit and therefore that he may have no cause of complaint. I think it proper to inform you of this and desire that you in (obl.) Conjunction with M<sup>r</sup> Croghan to whom he has committed the care of this matter may survey for him at such places as maybe shewed to you, if not before appropriated or settled, <sup>the quantity</sup> of Fifteen hundred acres and I shall forthwith acquaint the Proprietaries that I have given you this order. Henry Montour locates the above grant in Lack-  
 oriss Cove, situate betwixt Kishacoquillis Creek and } I am sir your most humble
