Whereas Robert Johnson of the county of York hath requested that we would ~~either~~  
~~take up~~ grant him our warrant for one hundred & fifty acres of land joining  
James Orr, Moses McCarley Anthony McCrackan & Robert Smith in Hamilton bar  
township being part of the 30,000 acres of land which by our warrant of the  
eighteenth day of June 1741 we directed our then Surveyor-General to survey  
on the Branches of Marsh Creek on the West side of the River Susquehanna  
then in the County of Lancaster now York for our own use & the same to  
return under the name and style of our Manor of Maske & it appearing  
to us that the said One hundred & fifty acres of land was settled  
before the issuing our said warrant for the said Manor. We have notwithstanding  
condescended & agreed to grant the same to the said  
Robert Johnson on the Common Terms, the Interest & Quitrent to com-  
mence from the first of March One Thousand seven hundred & forty  
one being the time of settlem<sup>t</sup> of ye sd 150 A<sup>s</sup> ~~the said~~ And for  
which he agrees to pay to our use, within the Term of six Months from  
the date hereof, at the rate of Fifteen Pounds Ten Shillings, cur-  
rent Money of this Province, for every hundred acres; and also to pay  
the yearly Quitrent of one Halfpenny Sterling for every acre there-  
of, to us, our Heirs and Assigns forever: These are therefore to authorise  
and require you to survey, or cause to be surveyed unto the said Robert  
Johnson at the Place aforesaid, according to the Method of Townships  
appointed, the said quantity of one hundred & fifty acres, ~~if not~~  
ready surveyed or appropriated, and make return thereof into the  
Secretary's Office, in order for Confirmation; for which this shall be your  
sufficient Warrant: Which warrant and survey, in case the said  
Robert Johnson fulfil the above agreement within six months from  
the date hereof, shall be valid, otherwise void. Given under my hand, and  
the seal of the Land-Office, by virtue of certain Powers from the said  
Proprietaries, at Philadelphia, this sixteenth day of April Anno Domini  
One Thousand seven hundred and sixty five.
