Whereas Hugh Dunwiddie of the County of York hath requested that we would ~~not~~  
~~take~~ grant him our warrant for four hundred acres of land joining Widow Lasley  
 Robert Black and William Quiet in Cumberland Township being part of the thirty  
 Thousand acres of land which by our warrant of the eighteenth day of June 1741. We  
 directed our then Surveyor General to survey on the Branches of Marsh Creek on  
 the west side of the River Susquehanna then in the County of Lancaster now  
 York for our own proper use and the same to return under the Name and style  
 of our Manor of Maske and it appearing to us that the said four hundred acres of  
 land was settled before the issuing our said warrant for the said Manor We have  
 Notwithstanding condescended & agreed to grant the same to the said Hugh  
 Dunwiddie on the then common Terms, the Intrest & Quitrent commencing  
 from the first day of March One Thousand seven hundred & forty one being  
 the time of settlement of the ~~sd~~ 400 As ~~is the~~ - And for which he  
 agrees to pay to our use, within the Term of six months from the date hereof,  
 at the rate of Fifteen Pounds Ten shillings, current Money of this Province,  
 for every hundred acres; and also to pay the yearly Quitrent of One Half  
 penny Sterling for every acre thereof, to us, our Heirs and assigns forever. These  
 are therefore to authorise and require you to survey, or cause to be surveyed  
 unto the said Hugh Dunwiddie at the Place aforesaid, according to the Method  
 of Townships appointed, the said quantity of four hundred acres, ~~if not already~~  
~~surveyed or appropriated~~, and make return thereof into the Secretary's Office,  
 in order for Confirmation; for which this shall be your sufficient warrant:  
 Which warrant and survey, in case the said Hugh Dunwiddie fulfil the above  
 Agreement within six Months from the date hereof, shall be valid, other-  
 wise void. Given under my Hand, and the seal of the Land-Office, by virtue  
 of certain Powers from the said Proprietaries, at Philadelphia, this sixteenth  
 day of April anno Domini One Thousand seven hundred and sixty five.
