Whereas David Durnwoddy of the County of York hath requested that we would ~~will~~  
~~grant~~ grant him our warrant for four hundred acres of land joining the lands  
of James McClure John Surreghen John Reed & John Stewart in Cumberland  
Township being part of the Thirty Thousand acres which by our warrant of the eight-  
eenth day of June 1741 We directed our then Surveyor General to survey on the Branches  
of Marsh Creek on the West side of the River Sasquehanna then in the County  
of Lancaster now York for our own proper Use and the same to return under  
the Name & styde of our Manor of Maske And it appearing to us that the said  
four hundred acres of land was settled before the issuing the said warrant for  
the said Manor. We have notwithstanding condescended & agreed to grant the  
same to the said David Durnwoddy on the then common terms the Interest  
& Quitrent commencing from the first March One Thousand seven hun-  
dred & forty one being the time of settlement of the sd 400 Acres ~~in the~~  
~~County of~~ - And ~~for~~ - for which he agrees to pay to our use, within the Term  
of six Months from the date hereof, at the rate of fifteen Pounds Ten  
shillings, current Money of this Province, for every hundred acres; and  
also to pay the yearly Quitrent of one Halfpenny Sterling for every acre  
thereof, to us, our Heirs and Assigns for ever: These are therefore to  
authorise and require you to survey, or cause to be surveyed unto the  
said David Durnwoddy at the Place aforesaid, according to the Method of Town-  
ships appointed, the said Quantity of four hundred acres, if not already surveyed  
or appropriated, and make return thereof into the Secretary's Office, in order  
for Confirmation; for which this shall be your sufficient warrant: Which  
Warrant and survey, in case the said David Durnwoddy fulfil the above  
Agreement within six months from the date hereof, shall be valid, other-  
wise void. Given under my hand, and the seal of the Land-Office, by virtue  
of certain Powers from the said Proprietaries, at Philadelphia, this six-  
teenth day of April Anno Domini One Thousand seven hundred and sixty five
