Whereas Samuel Gattys of the County of York hath requested that we would ~~grant~~
~~grant~~ grant him our warrant for two hundred & ~~50~~ acres of 250^{as} land in Middle
 Creek joining James Agnew David Hart Thomas Haddan & David Naugh in
Hamilton Barn Township, being part of the 30,000 acres of land which by our
 Warrant of the eighteenth day of June 1741 we directed our then Surveyor
 General to survey on the Branches of Marsh Creek on the West side of the
 River Susquehanna then in the County of Lancaster now York for our own
 proper use and the same to return under the Name & style of our Manor
 of Maske, and it appearing to us, that the said two hundred ^{& 50} acres of
 land was settled before the issuing our said warrant for the said Manor.
 We have notwithstanding condescended & agreed to grant the same
 to the said Samuel Gattys on the then common Terms the Interest &
 Quitrent to commence from the first day of March 1790 being the Time
 of settlement of the said two hundred ~~& 50^{as}~~ — ~~sixty~~. And for
 which he agrees to pay to our Use, within the Term of six Months from
 the date hereof, at the rate of Fifteen Pounds Ten shillings, current
 Money of this Province, for every hundred acres; and also to pay the
 yearly Quitrent of One Halfpenny Sterling for every acre thereof, to us,
 our heirs and Assigns forever: These are therefore to authorize and
 require you to survey, or cause to be surveyed unto the said Samuel
 Gattys at the Place aforesaid according to the Method of Townships ap-
 pointed, the said Quantity of two hundred and fifty acres acres if
~~already surveyed or appropriated~~, and make return thereof into the
 Secretary's Office, in order for Confirmation; for which this shall
 be your sufficient Warrant: Which warrant and survey, in case the
 said Samuel Gattes fulfil the above Agreement within six Months
 from the date hereof, shall be valid, otherwise void. Given under
 my Hand, and the Seal of the Land-Office, by virtue of certain Powers
 from the said Proprietaries, at Philadelphia, this sixteenth day of
 April Anno Domini One Thousand seven hundred and sixty five.
