Whereas Thomas Shannon of the County of York hath requested that we would
~~here take~~ grant him our warrant for three hundred acres of land joining
 William Porter Joseph Scott George Asprig Thos McCracken in Hamiltonban town-
 ship being part of the 30,000 acres of land which by our warrant of the eighteenth
 day of June 1741 we directed our then Surveyor General to survey on the Branches
 of Marsh Creek on the West side of the River Sasquehanna then in the County of Lan-
 caster now York for our own proper use & the same to return under the Name &
 style of our Manor of Maske & it appearing to us, that the said three hundred acres
 of land was settled before the issuing our said warrant for the said Manor
~~of~~ We have notwithstanding condescended & agreed to grant the same
 to the said Thomas Shannon on the common Terms, the Interest & Quirrent
 to commence 1st March 1741. ~~in the fourth~~ And for which he agrees to
 pay to our Use, within the Term of six months from the date hereof, at the
 Rate of Fifteen Pounds Ten Shillings, Current Money of this Province, for every
 Hundred acres; and also to pay the yearly Quirrent of One Halfpenny Sterling
 for every acre thereof, to us, our Heirs and Assigns forever: These are there-
 fore to authorise and require you to survey, or cause to be surveyed unto the
 said Thomas Shannon at the Place aforesaid, according to the Method of Townships
 appointed, the said Quantity of three hundred acres, ~~if not already surveyed~~
~~appropriated~~, and make return thereof into the Secretary's Office, in order
 for Confirmation; for which this shall be your sufficient Warrant: Which
 warrant and survey, in case the said Thomas Shannon fulfil the above
 Agreement within six Months from the date hereof, shall be valid, other-
 wise void. Given under my hand, and the seal of the Land-Office, by virtue
 of certain Powers from the said Proprietaries, at Philadelphia, this six-
 teenth day of April Anno Domini One Thousand seven hundred and
 sixty five.
