

Philadelphia 31st m^o 1684.

By vertue of an order from the Govern^r bearing date ye 28th instant whereby he was pleased to refer ye hearing and reporting w^t all expedition^{of}, y^e state of a difference or misunderstanding wh^{ch} unhappily fell out between Thomas Rudyard & Tho. Holmes to us whose names are here subscribed.

We to y^e best of o^r app^rhension upon discourse and serious perusall of ye warrants of survey, - additional instructions & y^e Survey^rs returne doe make this Report - That we really conceive that the orders and instructions given forth by Thomas Holmes Survey^r General in Thomas Rudyard's behalfe upon ye controverted Lands were intentionally and designedly for appropriating of ye same to Tho. Rudyard's use : And y^t the subsequent warrant of ye said Premises for Tho. Bowman could not directly operate to lay out yt Tract of Land to Tho. Bowman because ye same contents were particuarly^{included} in y^e prior warrants to Tho. Rudyard and surveyed in effect as being signally & especially bounded by ye words thereof (as lying between ye Lands of Cap^t ~~Markham~~ Markham & mine, saith ye Survey^r General) The warr^t of Tho. Bowman was to be executed upon ye Land not taken up & beyond Christopher Taylor if room were. In ye whole by what we have observd upon discourse and writings produc'd we finde no injury done by Tho. Holmes to Tho. Rudyard's Right.
