

Marple Road Improvements On Agenda for Supervisors

BROOMALL — The following agenda has been announced for the meeting of the Marple Road Improvement Society tonight at 8 o'clock at the Russell School, S. Sprout rd. and New Ardmore av.

The president's report and the township manager's report will be followed by consideration for adoption of an ordinance to establish curbs on First av. between Gilbert av. and Harting av. and assessing their costs to the abutting property owners.

Bids for First av. highway improvement project will be opened and tabulated. Plans for second improvement project will be reviewed and consideration will be given to advertising for bids for this project.

Further highway improvement projects will be discussed and asking for county aid in connection with them will be considered.

The police chief's recommendation that disorderly conduct ordinances be amended in Section D, which prohibits the discharge of anyone of firearms for any purpose other than the township.

Regulations proposed by the township board of sanitation regarding on-site sewage disposal facilities and an ordinance regulating swimming pools with respect to fencing and hours of operation, prepared at the Board of Supervisors' request by the township solicitor, will be considered.

Other items to be taken up include plans for increased street lighting of major arterial highways and for the purchase of a truck for the fire department. Plans for the purchase of a truck for the fire department will be discussed and consideration will be given to advertising for bids for this project.

Further highway improvement projects will be discussed and asking for county aid in connection with them will be considered.

Day School Begins Its 2nd Year

NEWTOWN — For the first time in the history of the Delaware County Christian Day School, seniors are included among the 282 students who returned to classes today. Eight students are expected to be in the school's first graduating class next June.

The school, located on Goshen rd., at the former Strawbridge Estate, began its second year of operation at this location this term. Classes from kindergarten to grade 12 are conducted by 14 full time and three part time teachers.

Started in 1939 with 55 students, the school was first conducted at the First Presbyterian Church, Springfield. In 1950, the school was transferred to Grace chapel, Goshen, where it remains today for five years. Roy W. Lewis Jr. of Newtown is the present principal of the school.

New Residents of Lawrence Park Protest School District Division

LAWRENCE PARK — Fewer than 20 residents of Lawrence Park protested a meeting Friday night at the Lawrence Park children's school last year. After an intensive study it was decided to place Lawrence Park children in a group to Marple by school rather than to the already crowded Russell School, to which they would also have to go by bus in many cases. They will be kept together as far as possible this year and next year will be taken as a group to the Lawrence Park School.

The only other feasible plan, Oseinsky said, is to equalize the size of classes at all schools would be to take some of the Lawrence Park grades to Russell School. New Church Nearing Completion

NEWTOWN SQUARE — Construction of a new church for St. Anastasia Catholic Parish is expected to be completed within the next six months, according to the pastor, Rev. Joseph T. Baker. The new church, located at Radnor dr. and Rockwood rd., to the rear of the present church, will accommodate more than 1,300 parishioners.

Built by M. L. Conason and Son, of Harroveton, the new edifice is of colonial architecture, blending with the surrounding homes. The exterior is red brick trimmed in Indiana limestone with flagstone porches, steps and landings and features an entrance ramp for the use of invalids and the aged.

A stainless steel tower which rises 125 feet from the ground was recently installed. Provisions have been made for the installation of Gillen chimes.

The interior of the church which takes the form of the cross will feature marble altars and terrazzo floors. An air cooling ventilating system for use in either summer or winter has also been planned. The basement of the new church building will be used as an auditorium for extra masses and parish activities with seating for an additional 1,000 persons.

1,300 Marple-Newtown High Pupils To Attend Half-Sessions This Year

LARCHMONT — Half-sessions, expected to be finished in another two months. The new wing will replace the 15 rooms destroyed by fire in April, 1956.

It is expected the seventh and eighth graders will be transferred to the new wing as soon as the building is completed, but according to the senior high principal, Herbert Rayhey, half a session will continue until completion of the new senior high school building.

New to this year's curriculum will be the addition of Spanish, beginning with the ninth grade and more elective typing for non-business students.

The crowded conditions are expected to be eased this year when more than 200 of the \$200,000 senior high school, located on Pine rd., about two blocks west of the new wing, will be opened in an additional wing to the present school, which has served as both junior and senior high.
